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### **Executive Summary**

### District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

**Vision:** To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

### School Collection Development Plan

Horizon HS serves 2320 students enrolled in grades ninth through twelfth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 48% Hispanic and 52% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 84% White, 8% Black, 0% Native, 5% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Andrew Jackson and Assistant Principal for Instruction Wessal Kenaio. Horizon HS is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include athletics, academic clubs, esports, cultural clubs, and culinary arts.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Horizon HS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2017 and the number of books per student is 3. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Horizon HS does not currently meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- The demographic statistics do not reflect the true nature of our population as a very large majority of our students have a Brazilian background and speak Portuguese.
- US History had a significant decrease in scores.
- The current collection does not contain enough materials for supporting low-expectancy students.
- Based on assessment scores, more emphasis and promotion is needed on meeting the needs of ESSER students. The collection will be expanded now that the middle school has moved to their own building to come closer to the standard of 15 20 books per student.
- The age of the collection is above the district average of 2007.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as aged titles in fiction and/or nonfiction, curriculum adjustments, and state guidelines.

#### Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data.

### **Collection Analysis**

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

- Due to the scoring of our low-expectancy students, we will focus on increasing low-level/high-interest materials.
- We will focus on weeding nonfiction titles due to aging.
- Because students turn to online sources much more than physical books, non-fiction is generally focused on student and demographic cultural interests outside of academic work.
- The academic titles that are in the collection were chosen based on the Florida BEST Standards and teacher input.
